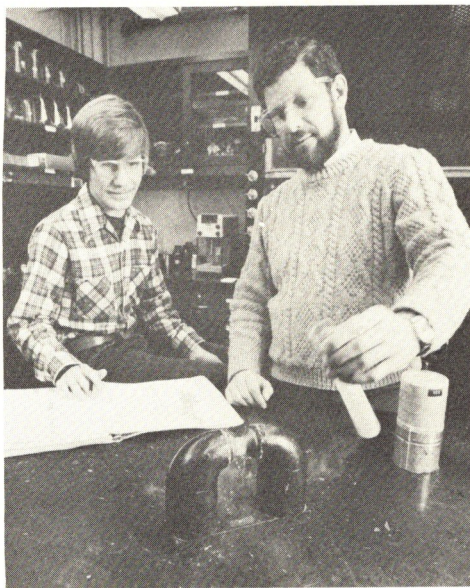

Dr. George Ross, the leader of the group, is the coordinator and director of jazz studies and jazz ensembles in the Department of Music at the University of Maryland. He won the outstanding jazz instrumentalist award in 1975 at the Notre Dame Jazz Festival. Dr. Ross won the best big band composition award in 1975. In 1978 he was commissioned to write a symphonic tone poem on the life of Frederick Douglass.
